#### He Wore the Mask

Devotion for a Pandemic

My two brothers are both growing beards. Little Brother Al says that no one sees him without a mask anyway, so why should he bother to shave? Big Brother Eric says he's growing a beard because it's something to do. (I always did wonder a little about Eric.) Besides, says Eric, a beard is always scruffy-looking when it's new, but the mask will hide it. Maybe by the time the beard looks good, masks won't be necessary.

Masks are everywhere—or, at least, they ought to be. When we see people without masks, we either want to keep far away from them or we want to lecture them. Masks are important!

But it's a funny thing about masks: they protect the wrong person! The CDC says that cloth masks don't really do much to keep the mask-wearer healthy. What they mostly do is to keep other people healthy. If you have the virus, your mask keeps your respiratory droplets from spraying out to infect other people. But if a mask-less person is sick, his respiratory droplets are so tiny and aerosolized by the time they get over to you that your cloth mask doesn't do much to stop them.

This hardly seems fair. The guy without the mask is doing the wrong thing, yet he's the one who is protected. The person who wears the mask can't save himself, but he does save other people.

That reminds me of a Bible verse: "So also the chief priests, with the scribes and elders, mocked Him [Jesus], saying, 'He saved others; He cannot save Himself." *Matt. 27:41-42 (ESV)* 

Come to think of it, the whole idea of wearing masks reminds me of Jesus. Masks are hot and uncomfortable and can even make it hard to breathe. It's almost a form of punishment. And all they do is protect another person who doesn't have sense enough to do what he should and wear a mask himself.

And isn't that exactly what Jesus did for us? We do everything wrong. We are "by nature sinful and unclean." Sometimes it seems as though we have no sense at all.

But Jesus did everything right. He was perfectly righteous, innocent, and sinless. And He took our punishment! HE WORE THE MASK! And He saved us—from sin, death, and the power of the devil.

#### We pray:

Dear Jesus, Thank You for wearing the mask for us. We're sorry for the wrong things we continually do. Thank You for forgiving us and saving us.

In Your name we pray. AMEN

#### Financial Update

From January 1st through August 31st, 2020, there have been 167 families or individuals who gave to the operations, needs, and projects. We thank you for your continued sacrificial giving as you are able. We are currently running short \$1,289 per week for a total of \$45,107 behind what was budgeted to receive. We are currently assessing our current needs and programs and have also reduced expenses over the last months. Although some have lost jobs and income, others are giving more and new people are joining our team in supporting the mission from God to the people of the east metro. Our congregation also received approval and opened a line of credit with our Lutheran Church Extension Fund. As of now we have not yet needed to access the line of credit.

We were blessed with a Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan. With proper tracking and accountability, the funds spent on qualifying items will be forgiven. These funds were a miracle and have provided a buffer to help weather COVID.

Everyone, adults and children, will need masks. You can help in three ways:

- 1. Donate cloth or disposable masks. Bring them to church; a box will be available just inside the back parking lot door.
- 2. Donate money to purchase masks or sewing supplies.
- 3. Donate your time to sew masks; supplies will be provided. Disinfectant wipes are also in high need.



#### Starting September 27



This series is based on a study by Gary Stump and the late Ed Watson from Onward Church in Fishers, IN. Over 60% of Americans surveyed said they would be willing to study the Bible if someone asked them. But where do you start? What is the Bible really all about? This study is designed to answer these questions. Over eight weeks we will look at eight key chapters from the 66 books that make up the Old & New Testaments of the Bible. These chapters will provide a fast-forward overview of the entire message of the Bible: God's love & sacrifice for broken people.

The Bible is the most read and respected (& controversial!) book in history. There are currently over 6 billion copies in print. Why is it so popular? What are the major themes of the Bible? How can we understand what it is saying—especially for us in 2020? The Bible was written between the years of 2000 BC and AD 100 by 40 different human authors, and yet it tells one consistent story of the Creator pursuing people to be reconciled to Himself.

Join us for this series of Sunday messages, in person on Sunday mornings at 8:30 or 10:30 a.m. in our sanctuary on Ruth Street in St. Paul, OR streaming-live (and recorded) at www.ehlc.org OR on our TurboBridge telephone service.
